Race Night for Friends of the Holy Land.

In November the Knights of St Columba Whitton Council 970 held a race night in the St Edmund's Catholic Social club to raise money and awareness for the Friends of the Holy Land charity. The night was successful in raising over £940.00 for the FHL charity. The gratefully received donation will be spent by the charity towards supporting a young Christian living in the Holy Land by contributing towards their university fees.

The race night was also a great parish social event, each of the horses in the 8 races were wildly encouraged as the winning punters cheered them over the finishing line. The licensed bar serving a full range of refreshments and a half-time feast of sandwiches culminated in a finale auction race. The final neck and neck race, worthy of a Cheltenham Cup, was between two horses, 'Saddle Sore' and 'Horsey who Horsey' the photo finish and the Steward's enquiry verdict awarded the race to Saddle Sore. The FHL representative Sir Vincent Keane gave a detailed summary and presentation during the race night on the situation in Palestine and how the FHL charity supports the diminishing Christian community in the Holy Land. The charity's key aim, through charitable donations, works to support the Christian community and keep a living Christian presence in the Holy Land. The social, political and economic situation in the Holy Land has made this a very challenging prospect, however, race nights and charitable donations can and do make a significant difference to give financial support and hope to vulnerable Christians. The following letter received by Bro John Lynn from Mary's Meals in response to the Backpack Appeal.



Dear John,

Thank you so much for your generous donation of backpacks and for supporting Mary's Meals.

For many of the children, the backpack they will receive from supporters like yourself is the only gift they have ever been given. Many children receiving Mary's Meals don't have basic learning tools such as pencils and notebooks or even clothes to wear to school, so your support is helping these children to realise their full potential and go to school equipped with the necessary educational items.

With the generous help of supporters across the globe, our school feeding programmes have continued to grow. We are currently feeding 1,504,471 of the world's poorest children every school day, in 18 different countries. Our average annual cost to feed a child with a nutritious daily meal in school is just £13.90 - that's just 7p per meal!

Our vision is that every child in the world receives a meal a day in their place of education. Mary's Meals is a simple idea that works – by providing a daily meal in a place of education, chronically poor children are attracted to the classroom where they can gain a basic education that provides an escape route from poverty.

Supporting Mary's Meals through the Backpack Project is a practical way to enable children to get the most out of their education.

The link below gives some pictures of the children in our school feeding programmes in Malawi receiving their Backpacks, as well as a picture of the Backpacks being loaded onto the container in which they are shipped to Africa and another picture of Backpacks being unloaded in Malawi. We also have a super 7 minute video called "The Backpack Journey" which follows Backpacks being packed by volunteers, arriving at our warehouse to go on the container and then finally being received by the children. Our Lady of Fatima comes to Ascot in Province 30. from Bro Tony Berkeley GK Thames Valley CI.984



On Saturday 25th January Thames Valley CI 984 and St Francis Parish were honoured to be visited by the Statue of Our Lady of Fatima and the relics of Ss Jacinta & Francesco, the two little shepherds, to whom, together with Lucia their cousin, Our Lady appeared.

Bro Nestor Baniqued (National Custodian of the Apostolate of Fatima), and GK of Cl 982 Wembley, wrote an article in the July/August 2019 Roundabout, which inspired me to follow up on what the World Apostolate of Fatima England and Wales was all about. I found that the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue (NPVS) of Our Lady of Fatima and the Relics of Ss Jacinta & Francisco were given to Great Britain by the Bishop of Fatima in 1968 after it was blessed by Pope Paul VI in 1967 during the Golden Anniversary of the Apparitions of Our Lady at Fatima. It was one of the 25 pilgrim statues distributed to a number of countries worldwide. It was again blessed by Pope John Paul II during his Apostolic visit to Great Britain in 1982. In February 2017 during the Centenary Anniversary of the Apparitions here in the UK, Cardinal Vincent Nichols received, blessed and crowned the NPVS at Westminster Cathedral; he also re-consecrated England and Wales to the Immaculate Heart of Our Lady.

This raised the question, well why can't we have the statue visit our parish in Ascot? I thought this was a superb opportunity to start 2020 with a gold plated **ACTION** project which not only honoured and increased devotion to Our lady, but spread the message of Fatima, attract loads of parishioners from the surrounding area, and very importantly, showed off what the Order of the Knights of St Columba could do.

After an exchange of Emails between Bro Nestor, Jerry Rivera (National President of World Apostolate of Fatima England and Wales) and my Parish Priest everything was in place for the great day. I put together an advertising poster, which was sent to all Province 30 Councils, the PGKs of Southern Area of the Knights, the deanery parishes, other parishes adjacent to Ascot plus a regular newsletter entry for the local congregation. Jerry Rivera sent in the program and the ceremonials that would take place throughout the day, which generated a print run- off for me to print 150 copies. Arrangements with the Head Teacher of the local school to run the background film of the history of the Apparitions and a presentation about the message of Fatima. All went like clockwork, thanks to Council 984 Brothers, Bro Nestor with a team of brothers from Wembley Council, Bro Alex Moore from Farnborough Council, KSC Director of Communications Bro Sean Smith, Supreme Knight Bro Bertie Grogan and Bro Eric Joseph, Provincial GK designate for Prov 30 and Bro Michael Bagness Prov Secretary Prov 30 and others.

Follow up ACTION radiating from this visit is already planned at Ascot, to promote the message of Fatima. Many a devotion that were vaguely known will now become routine at the parish; The Five Saturday devotions, the Six apparitions of Fatima with Our Lady's messages and Her request on EACH visit for us to pray the rosary every day, the devotion of the Scapular of our Lady of Mt Carmel and more.

I am hoping that more Councils will follow up on our experience and through Bro Nestor try to arrange a similar Statue visit to their parish. ®

Together with the Social Officer, he organises all social events, and in conjunction with the Parish Priest, organises religious events and other functions across the parish on behalf of the Council. Together with other brothers he plans an activities calendar at the start of the year and takes care of all arrangements to ensure success of the events undertaken.

He is responsible for directing the work of the Council in the interest of Youth generally. He is required to attend Provincial Committee meetings and accompany the Council GK to Provincial meetings when possible." ®

Pilgrimage in honour of St Edmund Campion SJ.

esuit priest and martyr he was born in London in 1540 and died at Tyburn on 1st December 1581, where he was hung, drawn and quartered, his only offence being his religion.

He is known as the London saint, by his death was lost a brilliant thinker and literary stylist,



comparable to any in the Elizabethan age. One who might have contributed no less effectively to his cause by the spoken and written work than by heroic suffering. He was canonized by Pope Paul VI in 1970.

The start of the Pilgrimage

The pilgrimage was first mentioned in the minutes of Province 11 in 1966. Bro. Sherry McGuy who was Provincial Grand Knight of Province 11 in 1970 thinks the pilgrimage was the idea of Brother Janssens and Father Barry, curate of St Vincent's, Osterley, he was also the Chaplain. Brother Janssens went on to become a member of the Board of Directors and was Supreme Treasurer.

The pilgrimage starts at The Chapel, Stoner Park near Henley, Oxon and is taken to many churches throughout Buckinghamshire, Berkshire and West London finishing with mass at Tyburn Convent, Marble Arch.
