Just a reminder that the 100 Club year is from October 1st 2018 to September 30th 2019, this is to offset the cost and not to be coinciding with the payment of dues.



Nativity Scene Painting Competition 2018

Since our last Council Meeting I have been privileged to present prizes at both Provincial and National level in two schools – Our Lady's in Amersham and St. Michael's (Primary Phase) in High Wycombe.

First came Our Lady's School on 17th May. Shrikar Polamarasetty received a Provincial Certificate for runner-up in the younger Age Group and a cash prize of £20.00. He also received a beautiful Certificate signed by the Supreme Knight for reaching the National Finals. I presented these awards in an excellent "Achievement Assembly" and was given a warm welcome and thanks from the whole school. She was at least as pleased as her son was, and very proud of him too. Shrikar was only six when he produced his most striking image.

On Tuesday 4th June, I was welcomed to the Primary Phase of St. Michael's by the Head, Dani Collins. She was very pleased indeed with the achievements of Karolina Karnas in Year 6 (age 11). Karolina won Provincial First prize in the older Age Group, which earned her a Provincial Certificate and a cash prize of £30.00. She too received a beautiful Certificate signed by the Supreme Knight for reaching the National Finals. As with Shrikar in Our Lady's, she knew nothing of her achievements before the day of the presentation. She was somewhat bowled over by the prizes and by the repeated applause given to her by the whole school.

They were extremely pleased for their school winners and several children personally thanked me for coming in to present such obviously high status prizes. Juliet Barreto RIP

In February of this year, Juliet Barreto, wife of Bro Mario (Esse) Barreto, GK of CI 163 Hanwell passed away. The following is a letter sent at the time to Bro Rosario Fichardo, PGK Province 30 on the eve of their Council meeting which I am pleased to include in this current issue of Roundabout.

Dear Brother Rosario,

My family and I were overwhelmed by the guard of honour and assistance given by the Knights to my beloved wife Juliet during her final reception into the church on 18/02/2019 for the Mass and funeral service on 19/02/2019.

We also thank you and the Brothers who visited and assisted us in hospital and at our home during our very difficult time. All the Brothers who attended the Mass and funeral services helped and comforted us.

Many of those who came from out of London for the services told me that they were very impressed by the welcome and assistance they got from our Knights at the church and in the hall.

Juliet was a great admirer and supporter of the Knights and she tried to attend as many of our events as she possibly could, her favourite event was the yearly Valentines Dance held at Hanwell at which she was missed very much this year.

She was my great supporter for last 19+ years both as a Provincial Officer and now as Grand Knight. Her two brothers-in-law from Canada, who are Knights, were very impressed at our Guard of Honour and the assistance given by our brothers at both the services. They also admired our Fraternity and Unity very much.

Thank you, brothers for your support and comfort and God bless you all and have a fruitful meeting, I regret I am unable to attend today.

Pilgrimage in honour of St Edmund Campion SJ.

Jesuit priest and martyr he was born in London in 1540 and died at Tyburn on 1st December 1581, where he was hung, drawn and quartered, his only offence being his religion.



He is known as the London saint, by his death was lost a brilliant thinker and literary stylist, comparable to any in the Elizabethan age. One who might have contributed no less effectively to his cause by the spoken and written work than by heroic suffering. He was canonized by Pope Paul VI in 1970.

The start of the Pilgrimage

The pilgrimage was first mentioned in the minutes of Province 11 in 1966. Bro. Sherry McGuy who was Provincial Grand Knight of Province 11 in 1970 thinks the pilgrimage was the idea of Brother Janssens and Father Barry, curate of St Vincent's, Osterley, he was also the Chaplain. Brother Janssens went on to become a member of the Board of Directors and was Supreme Treasurer.

The pilgrimage starts at The Chapel, Stoner Park near Henley, Oxon and is taken to many churches throughout Buckinghamshire, Berkshire and West London finishing with mass at Tyburn Convent, Marble Arch.

- Do I pray regularly for the repose of the soul of deceased members of the Order?

If we can consider some of the requirements mentioned above and line them to the Aims and Objectives of the Order, in carrying them out we will make our Councils and Order stronger by our own efforts and help us to work more actively as a group of committed Brothers and Christians. ®

The good cause we were too mean to support....

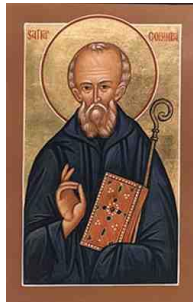
The extra time we failed to spend in prayer....

St. Columba – Our Patron!

This article was first printed in Issue Number 3 of Roundabout in 1994; I think it is worthy of repeating.
Editor.

Saint Columba is the patron of the Knights of St Columba, and a patron Saint is not only to be seen as a protector and an intercessor for the members of the Order, he must also be regarded as an example and a pattern – a model we must keep before our eyes when we are fashioning our souls.




How can St Columba be our model? He lived many centuries ago in a period we regard as less civilised and was a Missionary to the pagans amongst whom he lived. He brought Christianity to them. He taught them by his life and his words.

Is our period of time so different? Have we no pagans around us? A pagan is an unbaptised person. There are unfortunately far too many of them nowadays in this island. There are far too many who are near pagans, whose notions of Christianity are extremely vague, if not altogether mistaken and wrong.

St Columba had no help for the sanctification of his life, which we may now have – the Mass, the Sacraments, the teaching of Our Lord, the whole scheme of divine Grace.

The conclusion hits us with the force of a blow in the face. We can, and therefore must, model our lives upon his if we still wish and boast that he is our patron. "Be ye followers of me, as I am of Christ".
