Centenary Celebrations

The following is the address given by the Supreme Knight, Brother Bertie Grogan at the conclusion of the Celebration Mass held in Westminster Cathedral on Saturday 6th July, 2019.

"Our centenary year has been a very special one for both Pauline and myself. We have been honoured to attend so many wonderful events, and been able to see and hear first-hand the work being carried out by Knights across England, Wales & Scotland. Whilst there have been many highlights this year I believe



leading 100 pilgrims to Iona in fantastic weather, to the home of St Columba's Monastery. Founded in 563 by St Columba and twelve companions who travelled from Ireland, St Columba converted the Picts of Scotland to the Catholic Faith.

Today I am delighted to be here in Westminster Cathedral, and I thank His Eminence Cardinal Vincent Nichols for celebrating our Centenary Holy Mass, along with co-celebrant Most Rev Malcolm McMahon OP – Archbishop of Liverpool, Ecclesiastical Advisor to the Order and many local Chaplains, a most poignant day for me.

We remember our founder P. J. O'Callaghan and the 23 other Inceptors who on 5th October 1919 founded the Knights of St Columba. Since then, many thousands of men have followed in their footsteps. We are all workers in the vineyard and a successful harvest depends on each of us pulling our weight.

In our next century, Faith in Action in our Communities will be even more important. We are lay Apostles and must become more visible in the battles that beset our Country and our Catholic faith. We claim to be a Christian country but we are now being engulfed by the rising tide of secularism which clearly has the support of both parliamentarians and civic leaders.

Our values are being undermined under the banners of equality and political correctness. Same sex marriage, Abortion, gender choices, stricter rules on free speech, and of course the creeping in of euthanasia. Prayer is a powerful weapon. We must storm Heaven with our prayers to ask for help with the battles that we now face.

As Brothers of the Knights of St Columba we trumpet our faith to the world. Faith is our rock and underpins all that we do. The precepts of our Order are to work for the Spiritual, Intellectual and Material gifts of all brothers and their families. This must always be in the forethought of our actions. We are a Family Order and as such we must keep in mind the social aspect of our activities. As members of the Order we have a common bond that is important. Social events where our families can mingle are essential to strengthen that bond. It is often said that the Order could not function without the help and support and sometimes the forbearance of our wives and families. Indeed - please ask my wife Pauline about this!

These social events need not always be fundraisers but simply to foster inclusiveness and to bring new families and brothers into our fold.

I have a hard-working Board of Directors and a new breed of Brothers joining the Order, made up of many nationalities and backgrounds, which will enrich us and give us new ideas and renewed enthusiasm. They, in turn, will take our place and lead this great Order forward into our second century.

One of our main duties as Knights is to support the Hierarchy & Clergy. As I look back on our hundred-year history it occurs to me that it has been the Hierarchy and Clergy that have supported us!

and of course, a man I have worked closely with over many years but in particular over these last two years The Most Reverend Malcolm McMahon OP – Archbishop of Liverpool

Please pray for the soul of Bro Anthony O'Neill who was cremated on Wednesday 14th August in Easthampstead, Berkshire.

His family referred to him as the "Good Samaritan", always being the first to volunteer whenever there was a need. Even in the early days he carried a pot of smelling salts in his pocket which was put to use one day to bring the parish priest back to life after he collapsed on the altar.

Whilst he was a senior engineer working in the drawing office for LNER and then British Rail he fulfilled his real ambition when he retired. Acting as a porter in the local Reading hospital he was often heard whistling up the corridor and brought joy to the patients. A member of St John's Ambulance and later as a First Aid instructor for the Red Cross - covering the hospital and local events, he was at Newbury racecourse to administer his talents to Frankie Dettori after one of his tumbles. He was an organiser of parties at the Stroke Club and was always active in the local parish of Our Lady of Peace in Earley.

Whilst he was in the SVP, his true love was the KSC where he held most of the offices at Provincial level and for Reading CI 416. Tony was a Minster of the Eucharist bring communion to the hospital patients but poor health in recent months curtailed much of his activities.

He will be sadly missed, please remember his wife Angela, sons Paul and Martin along with daughter Judith who played the guitar at his cremation and of course all of the grandchildren. R

<u>A Double Golden Jubilee</u>

Where were you when man landed on the moon for the first time?

Yes, this summer saw tremendous celebrations to recall and remember that historic "One small step for man, one joint leap for mankind". On 20th July 1969, whilst the world waited until evening time, and well into the night, two men took another leap into the future, and this year they both celebrated 50 years of service to various communities as priests.

On that day in 1969, crowds gathered, including friends and family in the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Hayes, Middlesex to witness two young men dedicate themselves to God and the community they served.

Fr John O'Byrne CMF and Fr. Michael Fewell CMF joined the Claretian Missionaries of UK and Ireland.

The Claretians have been looking after the Roman Catholic community in Hayes, since they arrived in 1912, initially from an ordinary house in the town, until they were bequeathed the land that the current Church, Hall and School stands on today.

During their service both Fr John and Fr Michael have rotated through the various parishes run by the Claretian across the UK, and have served the Hayes community many times. Fr. John now makes his home there, and celebrates Mass regularly, as well as tending to his flock, in his

quiet unassuming and spiritual way. He has been a Member of Honour since 1996 and a supporter of Hayes Council for many years.

Fr Michael moved on to Wales after the turn of the millennium, leaving the Claretians to serve with the Diocese of Menevia. During his time in Hayes he was an ardent supporter of the work of the KSC, including taking on the role as Provincial Chaplain to the Knights



(2001-2002). When he moved to Tenby, he also oversaw the raising of a new KSC Council there three years ago as well as assuming the role of Provincial Chaplain. He now enjoys retirement in Swansea, and a well deserved rest.

Both these great priests have fulfilled their vows to serve their community, with numerous achievements over the years, too many to mention here. My wife and I were delighted to be able to join each on their celebratory Masses. We travelled to see Fr Michael in Swansea, and were warmly greeted by his new community there, and his family who were able to join him. A splendid homily by Fr Michael was followed by a lovely buffet, complete with a celebration cake and champagne.

Not a week later we were in Hayes, joined by a full church of family, friends, community and the Claretian missionaries to celebrate Fr John's Golden Jubilee. Again we enjoyed a lovely Mass, including an emotional homily and celebration in the hall afterwards, where we had further time to catch up with old friends and new.

Two truly lovely occasions and celebrations for two wonderful men, both of whom we have been lucky enough to call friends and we wish them both every blessing for the future. *From Bro. Mike Bagness*

Uxbridge Council 399

Uxbridge Council 399 comprise group of Catholic gentlemen who live and serve God by serving others in the Parish of St. Bernadette's, Hillingdon.

As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the moon landing, most remember astronaut Neil Armstrong's first words as he stepped onto the moon's surface: "One small step for man, one giant leap for mankind," but few know about his first meal eaten and first words on the moon.

Buzz Aldrin, the NASA Astronaut had taken aboard the spacecraft a tiny pyx provided by his pastor. Aldrin sent a radio broadcast to Earth asking listeners to contemplate the events of the day and give thanks.

After blacking out the broadcast for privacy, Aldrin read, "I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit." Then, silently, he gave thanks for their successful journey and received the Communion. Next he descended from the capsule onto the moon's dusty surface.

In Psalm 139 we are told that wherever we go, God is intimately present with us. Buzz Aldrin celebrated that experience in a special way on the surface of the moon.

Incidentally, Aldrin's first words when he stepped onto the surface of the moon were, "Beautiful view. Magnificent desolation." (\mathbb{R})

The Human Touch -Our hands say a lot!

ith body language and the healing qualities of touch being so important, where has the good old handshake gone?

Sick children thrive on being regularly held,

and every boss knows, it seems, how to read the body language of a prospective employee. But have they forgotten the importance of a handshake? – and I do not mean

Think of all the wonderful sayings that include the word "hands", like "...in good hands" – "...an old hand " - ...hand in hand" etc. Our hands say a lot about us and we should use them as often as we can to show friendship and generosity of spirit.

Of all handshakes, there is one that everyone will love to receive and will cherish the memory of – the handshake of a true friend. When someone takes your hand and then "cups" it with the other hand, you know this is someone who cares. It is sad to see people meeting these days, they say "hello" and that's that, as if they are afraid of catching a disease! If you want to make a friend then reach out and offer your hand. It will be remembered with warmth and the receiver will thank you for the human touch.
