Action and the Bible

One of the advantages of being retired and in self imposed lockdown is that you got loads of free time. My wife and I have adopted **www.Church Services TV** to attend online mass after breakfast. We visit different churches every day, often a good subject of conversation comparing one church over another. But more to the point we get to listening to regular Gospel readings, and some priests' reflections afterwards.

In the same week, we got the parable of the **Workers in the vineyard of the Lord**, and a few days later the parable of the **Good Samaritan**, both followed by reflections. I could not resist drawing some parallels. We the Knights often talk about the Workers in the vineyard when we talk **Membership**. We also talk a lot about helping those less fortunate than us, which is what inspired me when I bid to make the UGANDA STREET CHILDREN the Provincial Project.



We 'are' the workers in the vineyard, and we all know the parable of the Good Samaritan. The man begging for help, as seen by three passers by. They all were sorry for his state, but the first crossed over to the other side and passed him by, the same the second one, but the third actually did something about it, he stopped to help. The reflection afterwards stated that it was not enough to feel sorry about anyone in need, or to have empathy about their state in life, we can all feel sorry for those less fortunate than us, but its what **we DO** and not what **we FEEL** that matters.

What **we DO** equates to what **ACTION** we take in helping those less fortunate than us. In my fundraising work in the Knights, I have noticed that many are quite prepared to dig into their pockets and make a donation, to the fundraiser, the "middle man". It's their way of helping those less fortunate.

The Provincial project to help the Uganda Street Children raised £4733.00. Covid-19 did impact how councils could fund raise, and some councils actually finished up making a donation out of their council funds, some doing this in spite of their low budgets.

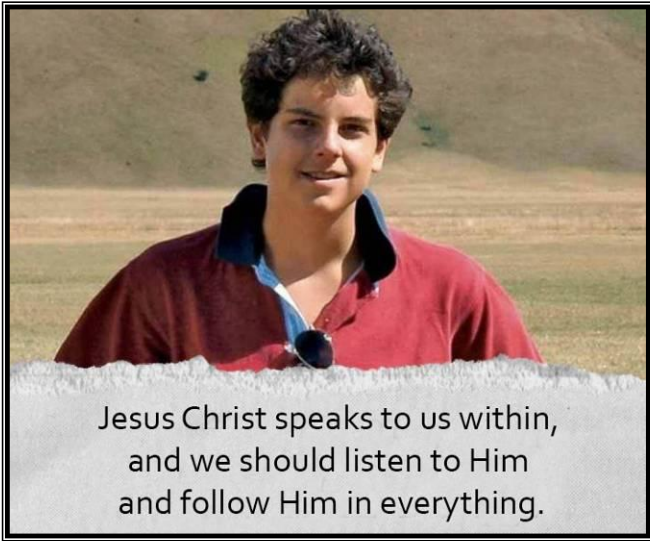
Admirable as that is, the lesson we need to learn is that fundraising is not easy. This is not because people will not donate money towards a good cause, but because **it needs fundraisers**, people of Action who are not just sorry for those they want to help, but willing **TO DO** something about it. There are loads of ways to attract donations, lots of innovative ways and some old run-of-the mill methods, like a 'Walk', but at the end of the day, it needs someone in council to adopt a CAN DO attitude, in spite of all the difficulties he may see, and take the lead and motivate others to make an idea a success.

I thank all those who contributed and fundraised towards the Street Children project, and hope we will learn and aspire to improve our fundraising skills in the next project we plan to adopt. Let us all remember that **ACTION** is **THE ENGINE** of the **COUNCIL**. ®



Blessed Carlo Acutis

who was born in London and then moved to live in Italy, and who was pronounced Blessed in October by Pope Francis. This narrative was written by the Chaplin to KSC Council 970 Fr Nigel Griffin.



'*Passionate about the internet and in love with Jesus and the Church,*' that is the description given of Carlo Acutis by the Prefect of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints ahead of his Beatification (a step towards Sainthood, in which the Pope declares that a person practised heroic virtue and lived in fidelity to God's grace, is with God in heaven, and is to be venerated as Blessed throughout the whole Church) which took place in Assisi on Saturday 10th October. Of Italian descent, Blessed Carlo Acutis was born in London in 1991 and was baptised at the Servite Church in Chelsea. However, in 2006 Carlo was called home to Our Lord at the age of fifteen having battled against leukaemia, during which illness he offered his sufferings to the Lord Jesus, for the Pope and the Church.

He was a teenage computer whiz, an ordinary boy who loved football, video games, school and his friends. He was known for defending kids at school who were picked on, especially disabled kids. When a friend's parents were getting a divorce, Carlo made a special effort to include his friend in the Acutis family life. From a young age, Carlo seemed to have a special love for God, even though his parents weren't especially devout, and Carlo fell in love with Jesus in the Eucharist. He called the Eucharist "my highway to Heaven."

He said, "my life plan is always to be connected to Jesus," which he did by attending daily Mass and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. He even created an internet site devoted to, and offering detailed information on, 107 Eucharist miracles worldwide. <http://www.miracolieuucaristici.org>. On the site, he told

people that "the more often we receive the Eucharist, the more we will become like Jesus, so that on this earth we will have a foretaste of heaven."

His Mother said that "Carlo knew that Jesus is really present in the Eucharist, but he realised that people need help to get closer to the Lord and specially to understand the importance of the sacraments."

Pope Saint John Paul II reminds us that, '*in a unique way the face of the Son belongs to Mary; for Christ was formed in her womb, and he received from her a human resemblance which points to an even greater spiritual closeness.*' Blessed Carlo loved the Virgin Mary as he did Jesus, and he found a deeper spiritual closeness to the Lord by daily praying the Rosary, which he said was "the most romantic date of my whole day." His great Eucharistic devotion helped him to understand that when we pray the Rosary, we pray to Christ with Mary; we proclaim Christ with Mary; and we are made more like Christ with Mary; for Mary is the doorway to enter into a deeper communion with Jesus.

Inspired by the life and love of Blessed Carlo, let us be encouraged to rediscover the Rosary in light of the Scriptures, which Blessed Carlo believed "was the compass by which we must constantly orientate ourselves," so as to be always connected to Jesus, and find in the Eucharist our 'highway to Heaven'. He is a vivid reminder to all of us, but especially the young, that it is possible to live a life wholly under the influence of Jesus even in our present day and age.

Our Lady of the Rosary & Blessed Carlo Acutis - Pray for us.

THAMES VALLEY - COUNCIL 984 in ACTION

On my visit to the Verona Fathers in Sunningdale, I picked up the Order's magazine produced for the Comboni Missions – the Missionary Order of Verona Fathers. An article there about the Street Children in Kampala, Uganda, really touched me, and I was determined that something must be done to support the Comboni Missions who try and support the children as best they can. As for any missionary work, their existence relies on the support of the Catholic faithful, so obviously I felt that there was something we could do to help.



I asked Fr Kevin Bidgood, my Parish Priest at St Francis, Ascot, if he'd let me take the coming Advent Parish Project to raise money for the Comboni Missions. The case was that empathy for their suffering was not enough and in line with the Knights of St Columba's Charity – Unity and Fraternity motto Council 984 believed that this was definitely a case for a **CHARITY PROJECT**.

As a small Council we always use "minimum effort for maximum gain" as the workers in our vineyard were few and not young. I went up to the lectern after Sunday Mass and asked the parishioners to bring me 200 empty jam jars, washed and without labels. I did not have long to wait the jars arrived the following week. Meanwhile we had some fancy labels printed and produced copies of the Comboni Mission magazine article.

At the start of Advent, I delivered my pitch, on how these unfortunate children needed help, I gave the parish their jars back, with labels suitably attached, and an envelope with a copy of the magazine article, and I suggested that by February, if all the jars came back filled with their offertory, we could raise £2000. After a few weeks, the jars started arriving, some took me to my word, and filled their jars with left over coppers, but many more had silver and pound coins, and notes of all denominations and cheques too. As Lent and Easter was early this year, I ask Fr Kevin if I may carry forward the appeal as an EASTER project as well, and he kindly agreed. I asked the parish to aim to raise £4000.



We kept the parish updated how the donations were doing. The hardest job was counting the money, and going to the bank, 20 times in all. In April our Province 30 also adopted the project as the Provincial Project, so I was aiming at £6000. Unfortunately Covid-19 put a stop to most fund raising by our Councils, and in the end we only raised £4733 which we presented to the Verona Fathers on Mission Sunday. This together with 700 backpacks that the Council was able to assemble for Mary's Meals is not a bad ACTION performance by any means. We thank all the parishioners, the local schools and Province 30 Councils, who sent in a donation from their funds, for their support

50th Anniversary of St Edmund Campion Pilgrimage

In the late 1960's Mgr Hume, Fr Tiger SJ and Fr Woodard of Our Lady of Peace, Burnham decided to organise a pilgrimage with St Edmund Campion's Relic supporting the Canonisation of a group of representative English and Welsh Roman Catholics who were martyred between 1535 and 1679; they were selected from 200 already beatified by earlier Popes. On 25th October 1970, Pope Paul VI Canonised St Edmund Campion as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales.

After the canonisation of the Martyrs it was decided to carry on this act of worship for Christian Unity and Peace. The Knights of St Columba were asked to organise the annual pilgrimage with the Relic resting at churches overnight following as near as possible the route Campion took on his way from Lyford Grange in Oxfordshire to where he was captured to Tyburn in London and where he was put to death. The route includes Stonor where there is a priest's hole and Campion famously hid his printing press and Campion Hall in Oxford that is part of Oxford University.

In recent years the pilgrimage visited over 50 locations and 55 Masses are celebrated. In 2019 the pilgrimage commenced on 1st June and finished at Tyburn on 28th July. This year with Covid 19 restricting church attendance during this period the normal pilgrimage was curtailed but my own parish - St Edmund Campion parish in Maidenhead had already planned a series of events to celebrate their patronal saint's 50th Anniversary. The summer family fun day and Summer Ball were cancelled but the planned walk from Stonor to Tyburn which mirrors much of the annual KSC pilgrimage route was retained.

The parishioners walked in eight stages of approx 5/6 miles each Saturday and Sunday during October arriving at Tyburn Convent on 25th October for a celebration Mass. The walkers were welcomed by Fr Liam Cummins MHM, the Parish Priest of St Edmund Campion, Maidenhead and Fr Kevin Jones, the KSC chaplain to Co 984, Thames Valley Council. The photo shows Fr Liam blessing the Tyburn Tree which is located on the pavement adjoining the Bayswater Rd / Edgware Rd intersection at Marble Arch. This is a few hundred yards from the Tyburn Convent.

The number of attendees at the Mass was restricted due the Covid distancing requirements but Bros Roger Khan, PGK of Prov 11 and John Boniface – the normal organisers of the Tyburn KSC Mass were welcome along with Bro John Lynn of Co 984 who has been an KSC coordinator of the annual St Edmund Campion pilgrimage for the last twenty or so years.



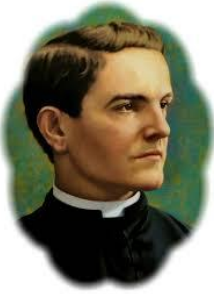
